

PROMOTING DIVERSITY AND EQUALITY IN THE EARLY YEARS

FLAGG NURSERY SCHOOL 2021

Children are born without prejudice. Prejudice is learnt.

When considering equality and diversity, we consider:

- Gender
- Race (black lives matter)
- Sexuality (LGBT+)
 - Disability
 - Age
 - Religion

Children are influenced by their environment and the adults around them.

STEPS TO INCLUSION

1. **Celebrate difference:** this highlights the diversity of the world beyond children's own experiences and helps them understand that everyone is unique and special.
2. **Creating an enabling environment:** School should ensure all areas reflect and represent uniqueness. This should never be tokenistic or a 'one off'. This aspect includes the emotional environment (how the setting feels and the relationships within it.)
3. **Challenge stereotypes:** We encourage every child to follow their interests, whatever they may be.
4. **Knowing our children and families:** Building strong relationships is crucial to inclusion. All families are welcomed at Flagg.
5. **Making it happen and reflecting:** Being fully inclusive is a constant work in progress, where we are continually reflecting and improving.

RACE

At Flagg, we want our children to be antiracist not just non-racist. This is not just about 'one big talk', this is an evolving journey. As young as 6 months old, babies notice racial differences. Our age group get curious and excited about difference and are learning about empathy and fairness. We have stories, toys, pictures, music and dolls that show a diverse range of people of colour and their culture, positively. 'Different is good' is the message we want our children to learn. We teach children that it is okay to notice skin colour and talk about race.

GENDER/ SEXUALITY

Nursery school has a duty to challenge gender stereotyping and celebrate all diversity, including LGBT families. Expectations can stop children from fulfilling their potential. At nursery, we proactively celebrate differences between children (and in the wider world) to ensure all children grow up as unique as they started out. The Equality Act (2010) states it is the law to include same sex parents, trans parents, children who don't conform to gender norms or are questioning their gender identity. As with race, we have a diverse range of resources that challenge stereotyping and promote difference.

HUMAN RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

At Flagg nursery, we follow the amnesty international guide called *First Steps*. This guide has five themed lesson plans each focusing on relevant articles proclaimed in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights covering feelings, relationships and belonging, choices and voices, well-being and bodies.
